

6 Religious Loans Box resources for schools

We are running a National Lottery Heritage Fund project called Being Brent - about increasing wellbeing through heritage. One of the parts of that project is to create six loans boxes about big ideas/concepts relating to religion in Brent and the communities linked to those religions.

Brent libraries have purchased 49 more e-books around different religions.

We will be sharing information from our archives and collections, interviewing people of faith from Brent and making videos to share on our YouTube channel. We are working with the people making the new Religious Education syllabus, curriculum map and lesson plans. Resources will be available from March 2022.

No. 1 - From the Ground Up: Exhibition at The Library at Willesden Green and schools workshops - 06 Sept - 03 Dec 2021

No. 2 - Faces and Places Loans Resource (Sept – Dec 2021).

The Faces and Places resource box containing portraits of 10 inspirational people connected to the local borough, cross-curricular group activities, and tools to create exhibitions.

This loans box can be hired from us from September 2021 onwards. Suitable for all key stages, teachers and pupils are invited to use the adaptable resources to develop creative skills around visual literacy, local history research and portrait making.

Not only is the loans resource a wonderful way to celebrate people connected to Brent it is also a tool for teachers and children to analyse how individuals represent themselves and are represented by the media. They will identify poses, environments and props used in photos to communicate particular messages.

No. 3 - Icons of Colour: Portraits of Brent's Change Makers exhibition and schools workshops at Brent Museum - Dec 2021 - Feb 2022

This exhibition will showcase key local Brent figures through the display of ten portraits loaned from the National Portrait Gallery, plus two new portraits acquired for Brent Museum and Archives. Portraits include local legends Zadie Smith, Riz Ahmed, Rachel Yankey and Courtney Pine. The exhibition will share stories and achievements of key people of colour connected to Brent for all young people in the borough to explore.

KS1 and KS2 Workshops: to identify and describe achievements of the people featured in the exhibition, identify different ways that portraits reflect the personalities of the people in the portraits and apply those ideas by planning/drawing individual portraits for themselves. Choosing from a range of backdrops and props, children will select items that reflect how they see themselves and create a digital portrait.

There will be free pre and post workshop PowerPoint, with embedded audio clips and learning points and activities for KS1 and KS2 pupils to use in class.
