
What is HipHopEd?

Workshop format:

For this year's BFI collaboration we are discussing HipHop pedagogies: **Criticality, Creativity, Community and Voice.**

For each of the workshops a LATE committee member has tried out a specific pedagogical idea relating to these key areas:

- Use of hip-hop lyrics in the classroom (criticality)
- Inclusion of student voice
- Remixing (creativity)
- The hip-hop cypher (community)

After the key note introducing these ideas, the speakers will each take a session along with a LATE teacher to look at how their theme could work in an English classroom.

Before the conference you will have the opportunity to decide which session you want to attend.

Plenary:

Rather than a conventional closing speaker, after the sessions, the closing plenary will be a time for each workshop to feedback their ideas for implementation, ask further questions and discuss the challenges facing HipHopEd.

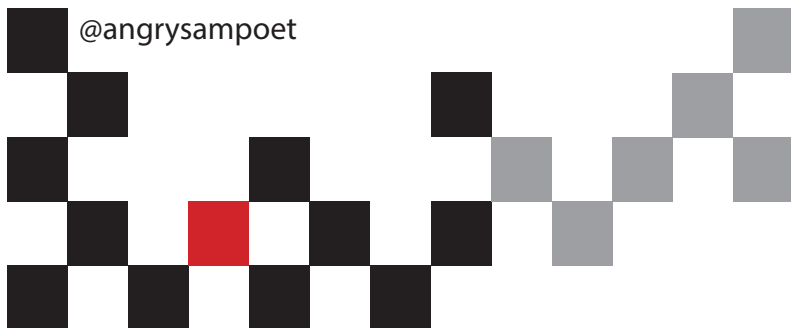
