
## Maya Questions

## Maya Questions

This is a framework for groups to post the questions they have raised after working with the Meet the Maya information cards:

in a format that can either be circulated from group to group or put on the wall of the classroom or corridor. If they have answere they can post them too. If they don't have answers then they can invite possible answers from other groups. They also might want to try out the questions on another class.

If you print the Temple sheet on A3 and the question blanks on A4, then the questions will fit on the Temple. Depending on how you organised the distribution of the information it might be that the question sheets can be thematic. The format allows for groups to revise and replace their questions and answers.

The cunning plan is to help children move from factual recall to more hypothetical historical questioning. If it works I'll make a series of Temple question sheets with other Temples.


