Nottingham Seasons Connect Four

This activity was devised for Class 3H at Brocklewood Junior School in Nottingham. They were looking at the difference between weather and climate/seasons and at the time appreciating that we were getting our spring showers rather late into May which is a month that can't decide which season it belongs to. The activity was designed to consolidate appropriate vocabulary and stimulate discussion around how weather affected their own lives. When we are sure about the categories on the game board we intend to produce a picture for each category.

You will of course need to adapt this activity to your own climate where you may have only two or more than six seasons. We may develop some comparative work so please send any work to the project on other climates.
